- Not peer-reviewed
- Written for the public, not for an academic audience
- Magazines, newspapers, blogs, websites

SCHOLARLY SOURCE

- This is a peer-reviewed source (has been checked by academics in the field)
- Written for an academic audience
- The article or book has a works cited page and citations
- You can find scholarly articles on search engines like PubMed, Google Scholar, JSTOR, and Web of Science
- Example:
